

ONE-OF-A-KIND AGED BRASS



In the renovation project pictured, located in Williamstown Victoria, aged brass tapware was used to bring the perfect amount of character, charm and elegance to this Victorian home, helping fuse the heritage of the home with its modern makeover.

Weathered or Aged Brass is a living, aged brass finish which develops golden highlights over time. Commonly used within contemporary settings, it provides a deep, warming contrast to light or solid colour surfaces, as well as a rich, dark complementary tone to darker ones. This finish is sought after for the unique characteristics that it develops overtime.

You will find this organic finish will age gracefully and develop a unique patina depending on the established climate, exposure, handling, cleaning, and waxing routine. Watermarking, oxidisation and spotting is normal and acceptable on organic finishes such as aged brass. As no two products will ever age the same, it provides a truly one-of-a-kind fixture.

Accelerated Age

The accelerated aged look is achieved by chemically treating each brass piece. Tone can vary depending on whether the brass is extruded, cast, machined or forged, but the result is a beautiful organic appearance. Over time the raw brass surface will further evolve as it reacts to the natural atmosphere it is in. Areas that are touched by hand become lighter, while areas that are rarely touched darken and oxidise to create a beautiful organic appearance.

Terrazzo (Italian for "Terrace") was invented in Venice over five hundred years ago. Workers in Venetia were often left with discarded marble pieces, where they would put these small marble rocks in clay and grind them flat. These were used as a low-cost alternative to marble for their living quarters. Fast forward to the 1970s, thin-set, or epoxy-based terrazzo was introduced. This quickly sparked the popularity of terrazzo, with a wider selection of colours, faster installation, and less susceptibility to cracking. To put it simply, modern day terrazzo is a composite material, made of small pieces of stone materials or chips (marble, glass, stone), bound together with either cement or epoxy, and polished to get a smooth surface.



THE 3 TERRAZZO's

I. CEMENTITIOUS TERRAZZO

This traditional terrazzo is heavy and takes a long time to dry. Colour choices are also limited and things like glass can't be used as it is not porous. On the upside, they feel more like stone and is ideal for both indoors and outdoor use, especially in high traffic areas.

2. POLYACRYLATE TERRAZZO


The "middle ground" made from a combination of cement and latex. They require less work and less product, so are less expensive. It has more design options, can be dyed to match just about any colour, and can often include glass and mirrored chips.

3. EPOXY TERRAZZO

This is the most versatile and most commonly used type of terrazzo in the market today. It's the strongest and the least susceptible to scratching, fading, staining, or cracking. Epoxy terrazzo is available in any colour and is the best option for making intricate designs.

TYPES OF TILES

BASIC TILE CATEGORIES & WHY TO USE THEM

Natural Stone

As one would expect, certain natural tile materials will cost more than standard ceramic or porcelain finishes but can be an incredibly worthy investment. Natural stones such as marble, slate or terrazzo will all fall on the higher end of the pricing scale due to their extensive mining and preparation process as well as the product's scarcity, but can create the perfect, elegant touch to a design. You'll find their luscious beauty and charm offers timeless appeal to any room or project.

Ceramic and Porcelain

Man-made materials such as ceramic and porcelain tiles are generally much more cost effective than natural products, with ceramic tiles often being the most economical choice of the two thanks to their lighter density and weight. Ceramic pieces are most often used as wall tiles, allowing a less labour-intensive finish thanks to their lighter and softer structure making them easier to work with, whereas porcelain tiles will fetch a higher price tag (both to purchase and to install) as they are much thicker and denser, making them an ideal wall and floor tile choice thanks to their increased durability, longevity and strength.





TYPES OF TILES (CONTINUED)

Handmade Tiles

Handmade tiles will often incur an additional purchase cost with consideration to the added labour involved in their creation as well as the specific skill and artistic quality of the finished product, but they can create stunning bespoke and highly personalised spaces. If possible, try to favour products that are entirely made and glazed by hand right here in Australia, meaning you not only support local businesses, but the tiles can be custom made to specific requirements. In particular, at Melissa Lunardon we adore porcelain tiles that have been printed with the use of digital technology. This allows for a crisper, varied and overall more realistic finish, and an incredible quality result that truly captures depth and character-filled variation.
